### Reflections on US Foreign Relations in the Trump Era

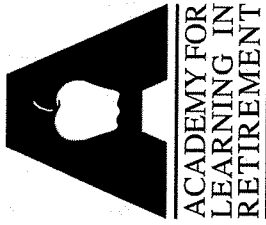

For better or for worse, the Trump Administration has radically recast key aspects of American foreign relations, in terms of values stated and unstated, policies undertaken or avoided, and the core issue of the role the United States plays in the world. In this four-lecture suite of presentations and discussions, participants will explore some of the key issues of creating a stable global system that shaped America's policies and relations since World War II: the international power dynamics that are currently at play; America's fraught experience of immigration, an underappreciated but critical dimension of US foreign relations that is of especial significance at this historical moment; and the question of where America is headed in its engagement with, or withdrawal from, the world at large.

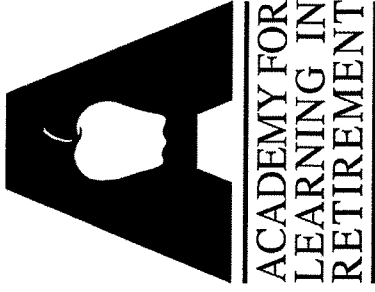

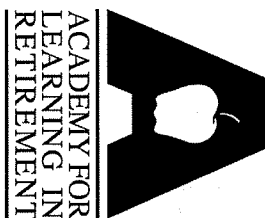
